# Rules of the Game

## Penalties, Fouls & Crossing




1. The white player has the line, and at fair speed the black player would be crossing the line without sufficient safety margin, resulting in a penalty against black.




3. When travelling in the same direction the black player may draw level with white and then force him across the line and take possession of the ball without committing a foul or incurring a penalty. (See "Bumping" No.3)



The black player may move in parallel with the line and play a shot, providing he can do so without interfering with white's mount or causing him to check back. If black should cross the line to the dotted position it would be a foul.





## Bumping or Riding Off

 In fast play black can only bump white if he approaches from an angle less than 45 degrees, and is travelling in the same forward direction. He does not have to draw parallel with white.  If at the moment of contact, black's horse's shoulders are ahead of those of the white player, he is committing a foul. He must wait until the shoulders of each horse draw level.





#### Hooking

A player may hook another player's stick to prevent him striking the ball, only if:

 (a) he does not raise his own stick above shoulder level and,

(b) he does not reach over or under his opponent's pony. He must be on the same side of his opponent that the stroke is being made.

### Safety

- Please stay behind barriers. Do not approach the field during a game.
  The field extends 10 metres beyond the red boards.
- Do not approach the horses and certainly, do not pat them.
- Please watch the game, a polo ball travels at 100km and can sometimes find its way into the spectators at speed.
- Please obey the marshals; they have a difficult job on the day to keep us all safe.



#### **KEN AUSTIN TROPHY**

Ken (James) Austin was only 19 when he and his brothers Larry and Jack were introduced to polo by their brother-in-law, Hector King, on his return from WW II in 1945.

Immediately, Ken embraced the sport with the passion that drove him for his entire polo career. An early memorable highlight - travelling to India with his brothers and playing polo with the Maharaja in Jaipur, where he celebrated his 21<sup>st</sup> birthday - cemented his life-long love & dedication to the game.

Ken played alongside his brother-in-law Hector at early Sydney clubs: Green Point, Rossmore, Cobbitty and then at County Polo Club, which was later renamed Sydney Polo Club. In 1970, Ken became President and Captain of the Sydney Polo Club, retaining these positions until he retired from playing in 1995, aged 69.

He devoted much of his time during that 25-year period to sharing his extensive experience, teaching and mentoring new players both in his own club and in other emerging Sydney clubs.

Ken, affectionately known as "K.J.", reached a rating of 5 goals at the height of his career, usually playing at No: 3 position, although he played at No: 4 in his early years. He was known for his long, decisive and powerful backhand shots.

In 1972 Ken was a member of the Australian team when it travelled to New Zealand to play against the local side and later that year, in Australia, against a visiting team from Argentina. Ken strongly supported the international exchange of the sport, both on- and off-the-field, and continued to participate in further international tournaments, as well as regularly mounting visiting players.

During his 50-year career, he competed extensively in club and high-goal tournaments in Australia, being a regular player at the Royal Easter Show for many years, and played in most countries where polo is played.

Ken took a keen interest in umpiring and the rules of polo and umpired many international standard matches.

He was also a keen breeder and trainer of top-class ponies and his bloodline's progeny continue to win major trophies on the field today.

Off the field, Ken's contributions to polo included holding the office of Honorary Secretary for the NSW Polo Association, being NSW State Representative on the Australian Polo Council and serving on ratings

committees.

During his time in office, Ken was a great advocate of the promotion of polo to broaden the image of the sport and sought to give it wider appeal through media coverage and sponsorship.

1988 he was made a "Legend of Polo" in honour of his contribution.

Sinclair Hill AM + OBE


Sinclair was called Wild Buck at school before his Polo career. He left school & went to the Goondiwindi Polo Practices & played a handful games. However in August the same year he left for England to go to the Cirencester Agricultural College. It was here that he made his connection with polo. It wasn't long after, he was playing regularly with his own horses and was picked up by Hanut Singh a famous Indian/English Polo Player. He was a wonderful mentor teaching Sinclair about polo on & off the field. He became friends with the Lalor Family, who were a young Polo playing Argentinean family who took him to Argentina & his polo continued to improve.

He married & returned back to Australia at Berwicks Willow Tree. He built a wooden horse to practice, & would practice early every morning improving all his shot making. He would return to England and play for Hanut Singh & Lord Cowdray. His handicap getting higher & higher every time.

In the meantime he had quite a lot to do with the duke of Edinburgh, played with him and coached Prince Charles. Then the duke came to Australia and stayed in Sinclairs father's home, Terlings, Moree where he also grew up. He played polo at Goondiwindi & then the next day flew to Quirindi & played there too. A few years later Prince Charles also stayed at Terlings, however this was not for Polo as Sinclair & Prince Charles became friends. In Prince Harrys' gap year, he came to Sinclair's QLD property Tooloombilla & Jackarooed for about 4 months. He was great fun & a great person.

Sinclair got his 10 goals & took polo teams all over the world including NZ & Brunei several times, also having the opportunity to play in the Argentinean open. He wrote two small books on Polo & Tactics to help young players. He took a lot of interest in young players and helped them. The family property Terlings bred wonderful ponies and with Sinclair's help, sold all over the world.

Australia has only had two, ten goal polo players to this day, Bob Skene & Sinclair Hill.
